VISTA / *Getting there*

Several major airlines offer flights from the UK to Australia, providing a range of options for travellers. Direct flights are available with Qantas making the journey from London Heathrow to Perth more convenient.

Other popular carriers, including Emirates, Singapore Airlines, and Qatar Airways, provide

one-stop flights via hubs in Dubai, Singapore, and Doha, allowing for flexible routing options and potential stopover experiences.

For the best deals, booking 6 - 9 in advance is recommended, particularly for travel during peak seasons from November to February

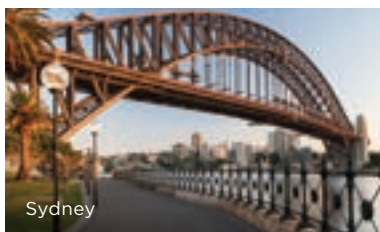

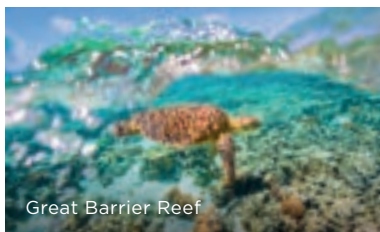

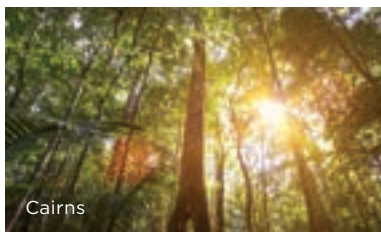

Pack Sunscreen and Stay Hydrated: Australian summer temperatures can be intense, so sun protection and hydration are essential.

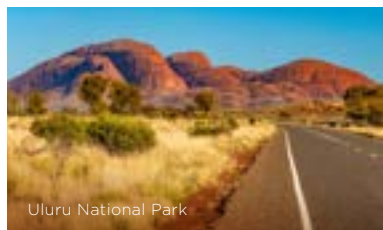
Book in Advance: As the high season, accommodation and flights fill up quickly, particularly around the holidays, so early booking is recommended.

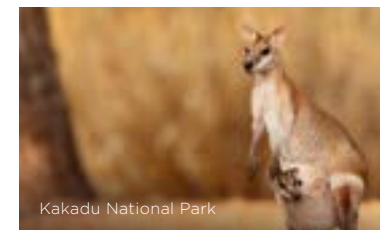

Best Time: April to September (Dry Season), offering clear skies, lower humidity, and accessibility to natural attractions.

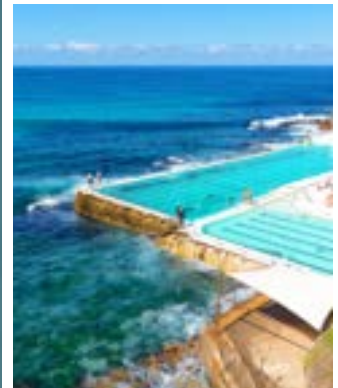

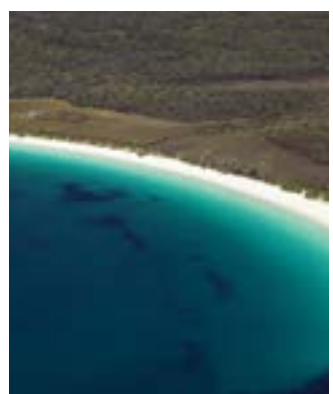

RAIL
